# What is deciding (decision-making)?

To decide (make a decision) is to select from available options, considering relevant criteria, before weighing up each option according to the criteria.

For example, deciding about purchasing a new bicycle might involve considering criteria such as the size, monetary cost, and the intended use for each available option. Each criterion might be weighted differently, with ongoing maintenance costs possibly outweighing most other factors when deciding on a bike's suitability.

A process of deciding may include:

- determining what decision needs to be made
- · considering available options and determining criteria against which a decision will be made
- · weighing up each option using the criteria
- selecting the most appropriate option
- checking whether the decision is appropriate.

## Decide as a cognition

Cognitive verbs are categorised using Marzano & Kendall's four elements of the cognitive system: retrieval, comprehension, analysis and knowledge utilisation (2007).

The cognitive verb decide is part of the knowledge utilisation category of cognitive process. This element involves the 'use of knowledge processes to accomplish a specific task' (p. 51).

### Decide in the Australian Curriculum Version 9.0

The cognitive verb decide appears in various achievement standards (AS) and/or content descriptions (CD) in the Australian Curriculum. The following table shows the use of decide across the Australian Curriculum in Years 7–10.
